COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The safety and well-being of our community residents in crisis and experiencing homelessness is one of the priorities in the City of Spruce Grove's Strategic Plan. 2023 marked the closure of the Community Hub and the August 15, 2023 launch of the Community Outreach Program.

The Community Outreach team consists of one supervisor, three community outreach workers, and a community peace officer. 1382 direct services were provided by the team, including:

25 individuals connected to income supports

20 individuals connected to physical health supports

11 individuals obtaining I.D



NEW 2023

Low Income Transit Pass Program (LITP):

Launched in August 2023, this program reduces financial barriers to transportation for eligible Tri Region residents. Further, the program provides three months of free passes to newcomers.

Bridging Connections:

In March 2023, CSD launched its "Bridging Connections" program to make frontline social support more accessible for residents. Changes include a shift to a navigation model where residents are supported by community social workers to achieve their self-identified goals and hiring of a community counsellor.

LOOKING FORWARD 2024

New Space

In 2024, CSD will move to 414 King Street. CSD's new space will enhance residents' accessibility to services and feature a community engagement space, which will be leveraged by the development of a community engagement strategy.

Community Projects

In 2024, there will be a continued focus on the priority areas identified in the Social Sustainability Plan 2023 Refresh with an increased focus on youth wellness, and important community projects such as the City's Work with the United Way, J5 Consulting and our community's social serving sector on how we can best support vulnerable residents in our community.
