Spruce Grove's City Council, elected in October 2025, is made up of one Mayor and six Councillors. Together, they serve the community by making municipal decisions, setting the City's strategic direction for their four-year term, guiding City Administration, and representing the City on various boards and committees.

Mayor Jeff Acker

As a life-long Spruce Grove resident, Mayor Jeff Acker is committed to this community. He first joined City Council in 2007, completing two terms as Councillor before returning in the 2019 by-election. He was then elected as Mayor in 2021 and re-elected in 2025, a position that was previously held by his father Joe Acker.

Over the years, Mayor Acker has served on multiple Council committees, including the Spruce Grove Economic Development Advisory Committee, TransAlta Tri Leisure Centre Board, and the Spruce Grove Library Board. In 2022, he was awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal alongside his father Joe and brother Jason and following his re-election in 2025, Mayor Acker was appointed Chair of the Alberta Mid-Sized Cities Mayors' Caucus and selected as Vice Chair for the board of Edmonton Global Shareholders Group.

Outside of the Mayor's office, Mayor Acker owns and operates a small business that provides custom web application and database development services for clients across North America, including both multi-national and local organizations.

He enjoys giving back to the community and is a member of the Knights of Columbus Holy Trinity Council, the Greater Parkland Regional Chamber of Commerce, the Royal Canadian Legion Spruce Grove Branch 281, and the Spruce Grove & District Agricultural Society. He can also regularly be found attending local events and festivities with his wife Jodie and daughter Sophia.

In his free time, Mayor Acker likes to go camping with family and friends and cheer on the Edmonton Oilers and the Spruce Grove Saints on game days.

Councillor Spencer Bennett is a lifelong resident of Spruce Grove who brings deep roots and a strong commitment to his community to his role, currently serving his first term on Spruce Grove City Council.

Councillor Bennett earned a Bachelor of Commerce from MacEwan University and began his career as a Financial Advisor. He later spent time working in the Alberta Legislature before returning to the University of Alberta to complete a Bachelor of Education. He is now a teacher, bringing together his strengths in communication, leadership, and community engagement. He has taught at several schools throughout Spruce Grove and Parkland County and is known for rewarding hard work with smelly stickers.

An active and engaged member of the community, Councillor Bennett has served on the Spruce Grove Community Services Advisory Committee, volunteered as a youth leader in several local programs, and worked as a basketball referee. He was deeply involved with Scouts Canada, earning both the Chief Scout Award and the Queen Venture Award. In addition, he has volunteered with all three levels of government and spent time serving on a church mission in Nova Scotia and Newfoundland.

City Council in 2021 and was re-elected in 2025. She also has the honour of being the youngest person in Canada to achieve their Certified Economic Developer designation.

Her involvement in Council committees has included serving as Chair of both the Economic Development Advisory Committee and the Parkland Regional Water Commission, as well as sitting on the City Centre Business Association and Youth Advisory Committee.

Councillor Carter has had a passion for ice skating since she was young, earning a gold medal at the 2008 Alberta Winter Games. She continues to be involved in the sport, supporting young skaters as a coach and Club Director with the Tri Area Skating Club.

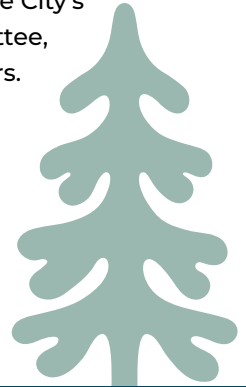
has worked across several industries before moving into the non-profit sector.

She is currently serving on the Meridian Housing Foundation and the Regional Water Commission board and was the driving force behind the creation of the Community Services Advisory Committee, on which she also served in 2025.

In addition to her Council work, she founded the Parkland Pregnancy Support Centre and the Hope Beverly House Society, which provides safe-house protection for families fleeing domestic violence. She is also a member of the local business community as co-owner of the microbrewery and taproom RavenWolf Brewing Co Ltd.

Councillor Mastaler is also a long-standing member of the Rotary Club of Spruce Grove, currently serving as Treasurer for the club and Secretary of the Rotary Club of Spruce Grove Community Partners Society. He has previously served on the board of the Spruce Grove Skate Park Society and coaches junior curling at the Spruce Grove Curling Centre.

The makings of a new Strategic Plan

One of Council's first priorities after being elected is to develop a Strategic Plan that will guide the City's direction over the next four years. This process includes a series of strategic planning sessions and an opportunity for community input before the plan is finalized.

The Strategic Plan reflects the feedback and concerns residents shared along the campaign trail and will establish Council's priorities for 2026–2029. You can find updates and more information at sprucegrove.org/StrategicPlan.



Council meetings

Spruce Grove City Council typically meets three times per month on Monday evenings, except in July, August, and December, when they meet once or twice a month. While there are several types of Council meetings, they are all slightly different. Let's explore what sets them apart.

Regular Council meetings

Regular Council meetings provide an opportunity for decision making and can include bylaw considerations, public hearings, and discussions on business items. They also include a Public Input Session so that members of the community can ask questions or make statements to City Council.

Governance and Priorities Committee meetings

Governance and Priorities Committee meetings typically include research, information, and discussion based on Council's strategic priorities. The Committee cannot make decisions but can provide recommendations to Council through motions. The Committee can also direct Administration to conduct further research on a topic, or make amendments to bylaws, policies, or plans to be approved at a future Council meeting.

The public is welcome to attend both Regular Council and Governance and Priorities Committee meetings. Meetings typically start at 6 p.m. and can be attended in-person in Council Chambers (located on the third floor of City Hall) or livestreamed online. Please note that meeting dates and times may occasionally be cancelled or changed. Visit sprucegrove.org/Agenda for upcoming meeting dates and agendas.

Organizational meetings

Organizational meetings take place each fall to schedule upcoming Regular Council meetings and Governance and Priorities Committee meetings, appoint Councillors to boards and committees, and determine Council Chamber seating arrangements.

Budget and Fiscal Plan meetings

Every fall, Administration presents a proposed Budget and Fiscal Plan to Council through a dedicated Governance and Priorities Committee meeting which may occur over several evenings. The Budget and Fiscal Plan is then amended based on deliberations and direction received.

Participate in a meeting

If individuals or organizations would like to present to Council, there are two ways to do so – through delegations or Public Input Sessions.

Delegations

Organizations or groups made up of more than one individual can request an appointment to be heard by Council. To get started, submit a request to cityclerk@sprucegrove.org with the group or organization name, the subject matter you'd like to present on, and any other helpful information. If the request is approved, City Clerk's Office will reach out to arrange a time to present at an upcoming meeting.

Public Input Session

Members of the public can also take part through the Public Input Session, where they're welcome to ask Council a question or share a statement on matters or issues pertaining to the City.

Participation is available both in person and virtually, making it easy to join in whichever way works best for you. If you'd like to participate virtually, please ensure you register prior to 12 p.m. (noon) the day of the Council meeting by emailing cityclerk@sprucegrove.org. To participate as a Delegation or in the Public Input Session, visit sprucegrove.org/CouncilPresentations.

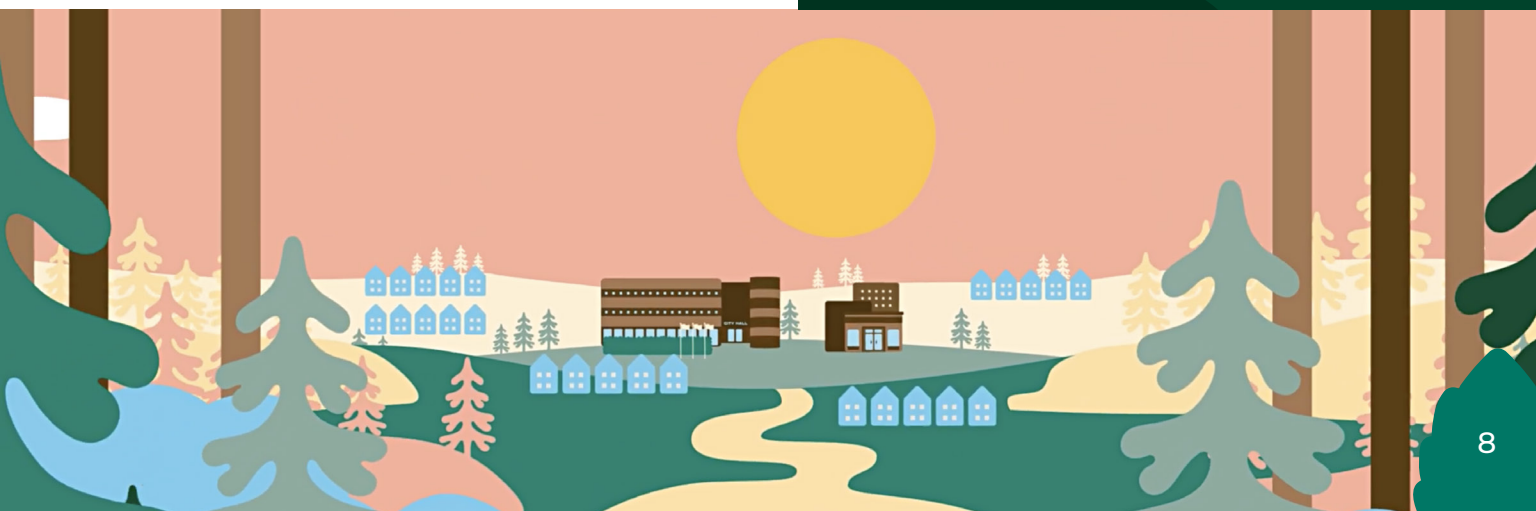

Celebrating 40 years as a city

This year marks a major milestone for Spruce Grove, as we celebrated the 40th anniversary of incorporation as a city on Sunday, March 1, 2026. A community celebration was hosted at Heavy Metal Place featuring heritage displays, family activities, musical entertainment, and fireworks.

Over the past four decades, Spruce Grove has grown from a small town of less than 12,000 people into a vibrant, thriving, mid-size city of nearly 44,000, with new neighbourhoods, parks, schools, businesses, and amenities. But what's always mattered most has never changed: Spruce Grove continues to be a place where neighbours look out for one another, where families put down roots, businesses thrive, and a place that people take pride in calling home. Mayor 1977-1989

What is your best memory from your time as Mayor of Spruce Grove?

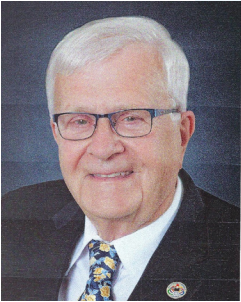

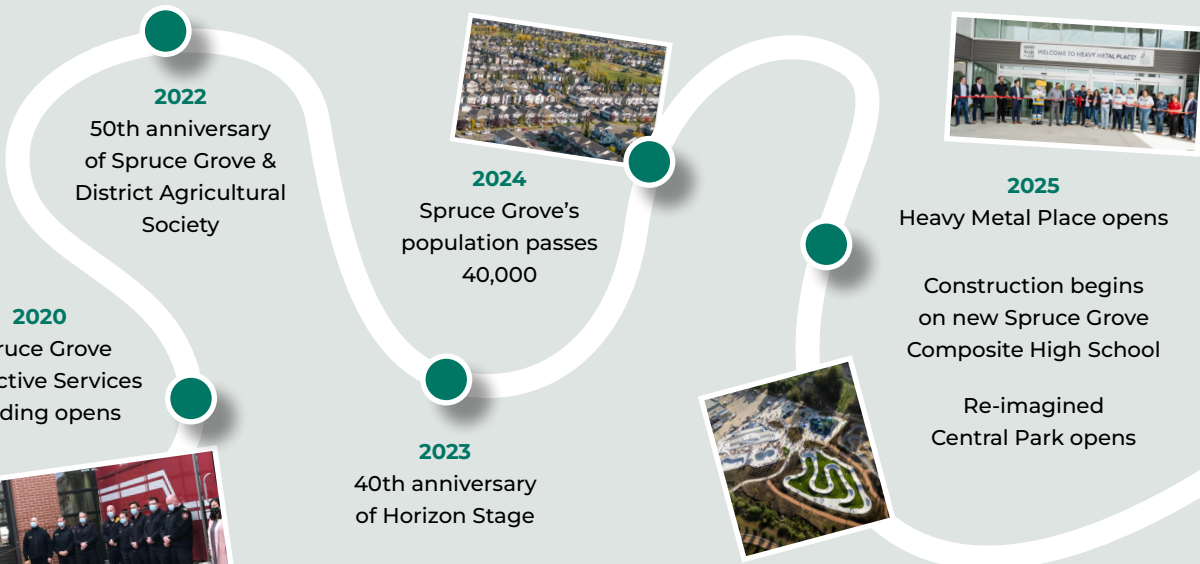

Introducing a new brand for Spruce Grove

Inspired by vibrant parks and green spaces, a warm community spirit, and an active, welcoming environment, earlier this year and in conjunction with our 40th anniversary as a City, we unveiled a new brand for Spruce Grove that captures our exciting journey forward, while staying rooted in what matters most.

Development of the new brand began in 2024 with a comprehensive community engagement process that included focus groups, interviews, and more than 600 survey responses from residents, business owners, community leaders, City Council, and staff. This feedback was used to guide the creation of our new brand that highlights Spruce Grove as a place where people, families and businesses can all grow and thrive together.

Since its launch at the end of February, the new brand is being gradually rolled out across the community, allowing us to introduce new brand elements, while also being fiscally responsible with a phased implementation. It was immediately incorporated into the City's website, social media, and other electronic communications and will now start to gradually appear on buildings, vehicles, signs, and equipment as part of regular maintenance and replacement schedules, which means you will most likely see both new and old branding throughout the community during this transition phase.

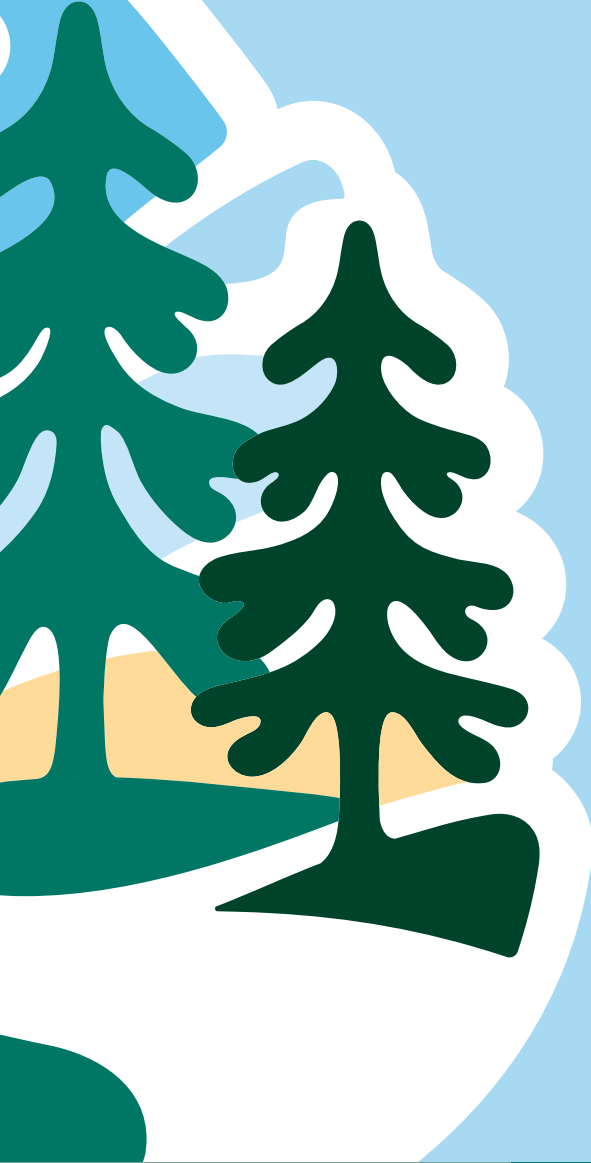

Government roles and responsibilities

In Canada, there are three distinct levels of government – municipal, provincial, and federal – and each level is responsible for looking after different things. It can sometimes be confusing to know who’s responsible for what, so let’s break it down:

Municipal government

Municipal governments – like us! – are responsible for establishing rules and bylaws and delivering services to the community, like fire protection, public transportation, snow removal, waste management, and park and greenspace maintenance. Municipal governments are typically cities or towns, but not always! They can also be counties, villages, summer villages, municipal districts and improvement districts.

Provincial government

Provincial governments, sometimes called territorial governments, make decisions that affect the entire province or territory. Our provincial government, the Government of Alberta, looks after things like education, health care and hospitals, provincial taxes, and the age of majority.

Federal government






The federal government (the Government of Canada) oversees things that affect the entire country. This includes items like postal service, national defense, the Supreme Court, passports, federal income tax, and employment insurance.

Who does what?

For many programs and services, it’s quite straightforward to tell which level of government is responsible for what, but with others, it can be more challenging to identify. In some cases, responsibilities can overlap or even be jointly delivered by two or more levels of government.

Re-imagined Central Park

The new and improved Central Park opened to visitors in August 2025 following a multi-year enhancement project that includes a dynamic new wheeled sports park, a playground with accessible features, a shade structure with picnic tables, and upgrades to pathways, benches, and lighting.

In April 2026, City Council approved the Central Park Activation Plan including funding for two new seasonal bylaw officers who will provide regular patrols of the park as well as other parks and trails throughout the city. Their focus will be on safety, proper use, and promoting positive behaviour. The consistent, uniformed presence in the area will be complemented by new, permanent security cameras. Wheeled sports park

Spruce Grove is now home to one of the largest and most feature-rich municipal wheeled sports parks in the province. The Central Park facility consists of a street-style terrain park featuring ramps, ledges, and stairs, a concrete pump track, and a groomed bike skills area. The wheeled sports park is open during the spring, summer, and fall months from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily.



Enhanced programming

New and expanded summer programming is planned for Central Park this year, based out of the Lions Log Cabin. Offerings include programs for youth, families, and seniors, as well as registered and drop-in opportunities at the wheeled sports park. Parks and trails

Did you know? Spruce Grove is home to nearly 50 parks and has several kilometres of paved, shale, and gravel multi-use pathways to explore!



In the summer months, the REMAX Spray Park at Jubilee Park is a popular spot for families to cool off and enjoy the sunshine. City staff are on site during operating hours to ensure user safety, monitor the park's water quality, perform maintenance, and provide overall supervision of the park. 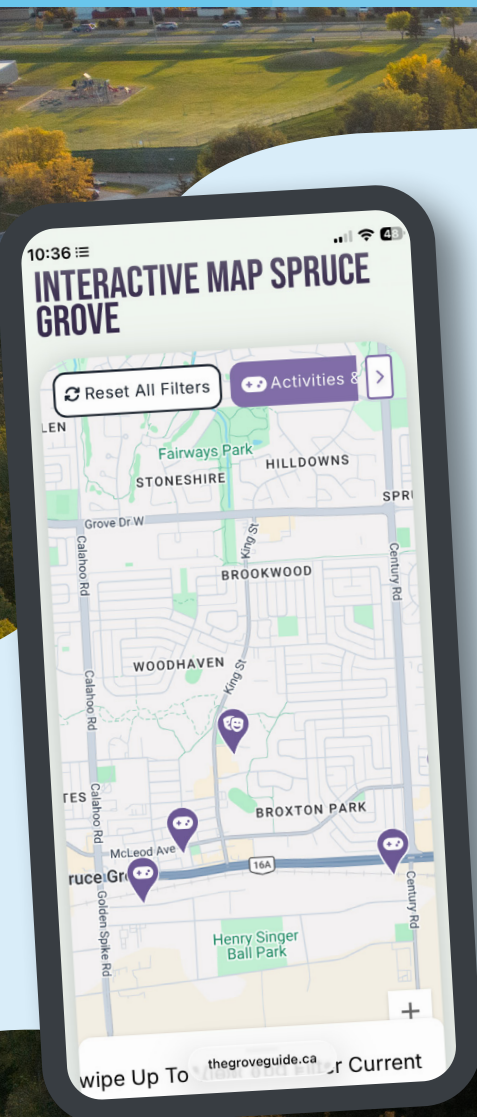

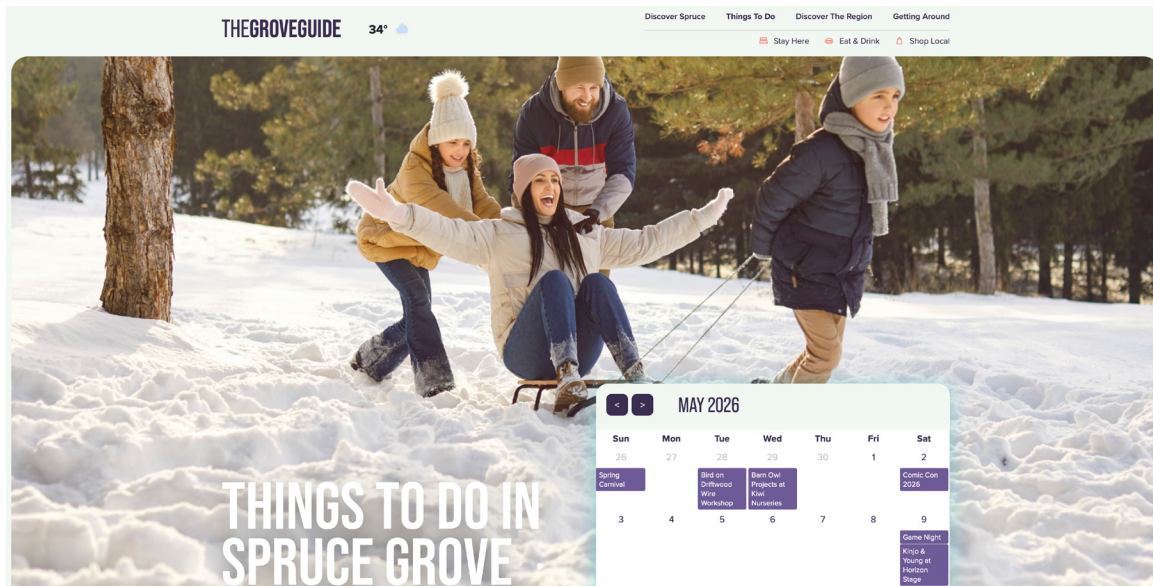

Transit Centre



The Spruce Grove Transit Centre is located at 50 Westwind Drive, just outside Heavy Metal Place. Offering a heated and lit shelter, free parking, bike racks,

and passenger drop-off/pick-up zones, the Transit Centre is the hub for all commuter transit in and out of Spruce Grove. It's also a regular on-demand local transit stop, providing patrons of Heavy Metal Place a quick and convenient way to get there and enjoy all the amenities.

Commuter service to Edmonton

Hop on Route 560 to take a ride between Spruce Grove and NAIT, MacEwan University, and downtown Edmonton on weekdays (except statutory holidays). For the full schedule, fares, and to see the live location of the bus, visit sprucegrove.org/Transit.

Accessible Transportation Service

Accessible Transportation Service offers door-to-door transportation within Spruce Grove, Stony Plain, and specific areas of Parkland County, as well as drop-off in Edmonton. The service is available to any resident, 16 years of age and over, who is unable to utilize the existing fully accessible conventional public transit service due to a physical or cognitive disability. Transit fares

There are three ways to pay your Spruce Grove Transit fare:

- By cash (no change given)
- Tap to pay with a physical or digital credit/debit card (on a smart phone or smart watch)
- Using an Arc card

*The Arc system uses a tap-on, tap-off system to track rides on transit buses and LRT throughout the region. Tapping on and off for each leg of a journey ensures riders are charged the lowest fare for their trip. Once a rider reaches the monthly fare cap, they ride for the rest of the month for free!

Transit e-Bulletin

Spruce Grove Transit's e-Bulletin is an easy way to stay updated about events that may impact your travel. You'll receive email updates about schedule changes, bus stop closures, and construction notices. Sign up at sprucegrove.org/Transit.



On-demand local transit

Spruce Grove's on-demand local transit service makes it easy to travel around the city or connect to Stony Plain, Parkland Village, or Acheson. The single integrated service provides many benefits for residents, such as short travel times and one local fare, however, each municipality sets its own hours of operation.

In 2025, we added more buses during peak hours and expanded service to seven days per week with the introduction of Sunday service in Spruce Grove.

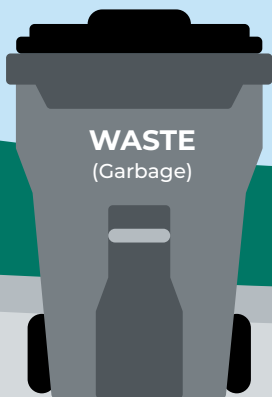
Waste, organics, and recycling collection in Spruce Grove

The City of Spruce Grove offers a comprehensive residential waste collection program featuring residential pick-up and Eco Centre drop off. Annual seasonal events also include extra organics collections, Large Item Pick Up, Free-cycle, Shred-4-Free, and E-Waste Collection.



Residential waste collection

The City's residential waste collection program includes three streams:



Items are considered to be garbage if they can't be recycled or disposed of in your green organics cart, or at the Eco Centre. Waste goes in black waste carts that are collected weekly.



Organics materials include food and yard waste (think apple cores and grass clippings!). These materials can be placed in green organics carts that are collected weekly from mid-April to mid-November and monthly from December to March.



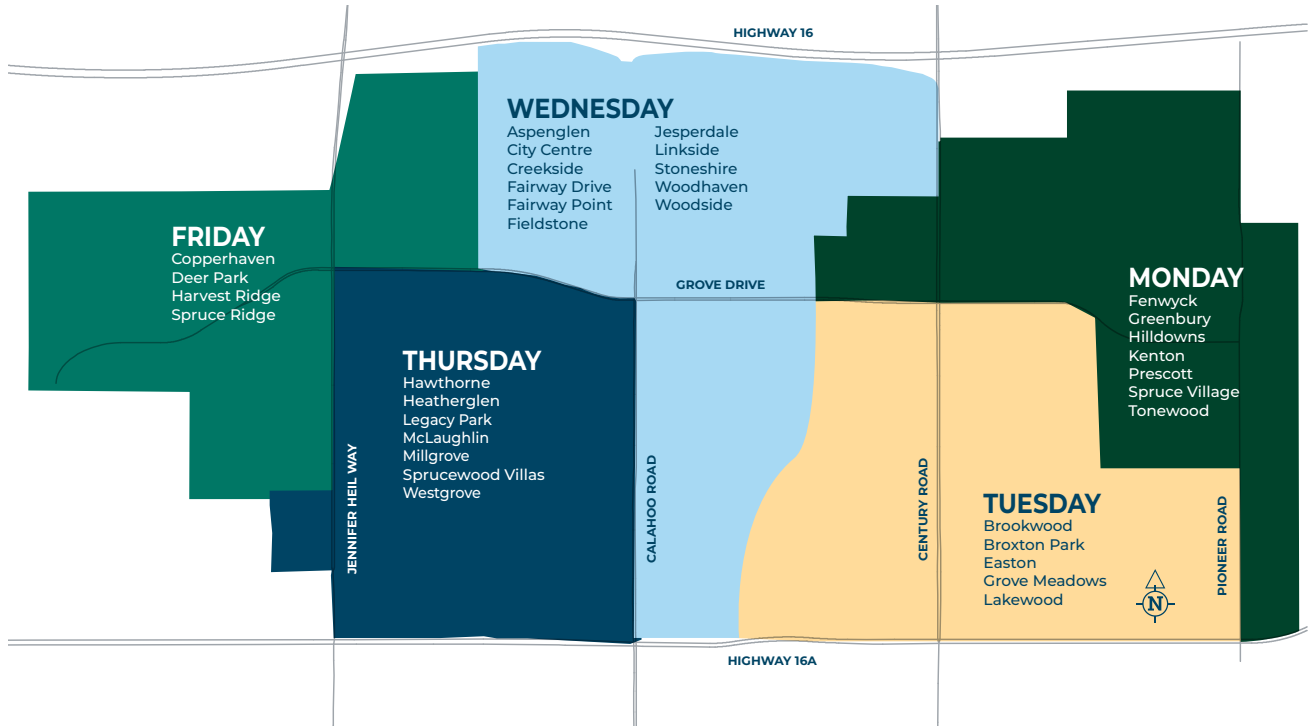
Never miss a collection day again! Subscribe to waste collection reminders through text, email, or phone calls at sprucegrove.org/Sort.



There are many items that can be diverted from landfill by being recycled instead! These items go in blue recycling bags, which are collected weekly.

Collection days

Each neighbourhood in Spruce Grove has waste collection on a designated day of the week (see map below to find your neighbourhood schedule). Statutory holidays do not affect collection days unless otherwise noted. For more details on waste collection services, visit sprucegrove.org/Waste.



Eco Centre

Open seven days a week, the Eco Centre is your convenient go-to facility for disposing of items that can't go in your black waste cart, blue recycling bag, or green organics cart.

This includes household hazardous waste, batteries, electronics, appliances, clear glass jars, blue bag recyclables, extra garbage that doesn't fit in your cart, and much more. Just keep in mind that some items may be subject to a disposal fee.

In 2025, 33.7% of curbside waste was diverted from the landfill through organics collection and blue bag recycling.

Black waste cart

- Air and furnace filters

Green organics cart

- Animal and pet waste*

*Must be put into a compostable bag before being placed into an organics cart.



Blue recycling bags

- Tetra paks (soup, egg, and milk cartons)
- Plastic clamshell packaging
- Foil and plastic takeout containers
- Aluminum foil and cans
- Paper and cardboard
- Envelopes with and without windows
- Magazines



Eco Centre

- Batteries
- Clear glass jars
- Nail polish
- Styrofoam
- Electronic waste
- Aerosol containers
- Toner and ink cartridges

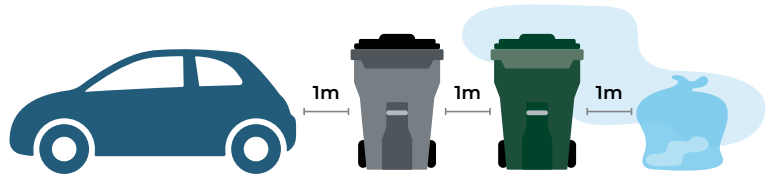
Waste collection guidelines

You can do your part to help maintain a clean and safe neighbourhood while reducing hazards and pests by following these guidelines!

Cart placement

- Set out carts and blue bags by 7 a.m. on your designated collection day, but no earlier than 24 hours in advance.
- Position carts correctly on the street against the curb, or at the edge of your property if collection is picked up in the alley. Ensure the arrows on the carts face outward toward the road.
- Maintain at least one metre of clearance on all sides of carts, and around blue bags, to allow for safe collection. This helps our crews safely pick up carts and blue bags without worrying about vehicles or objects.
- Ensure cart lids are fully closed.
- Maximum weight per cart is 200 lbs.
- After collection, remove carts by 11:59 p.m. on collection day to keep streets and alleys clear.

Waste collection for secondary suites

If you have or live in a secondary suite, additional waste and organics carts can be requested under the property's primary utility account. A solid waste utility fee is applied to the primary account for additional carts.

Only legal secondary suites such as a basement suite, a garage suite, or a garden suite can qualify

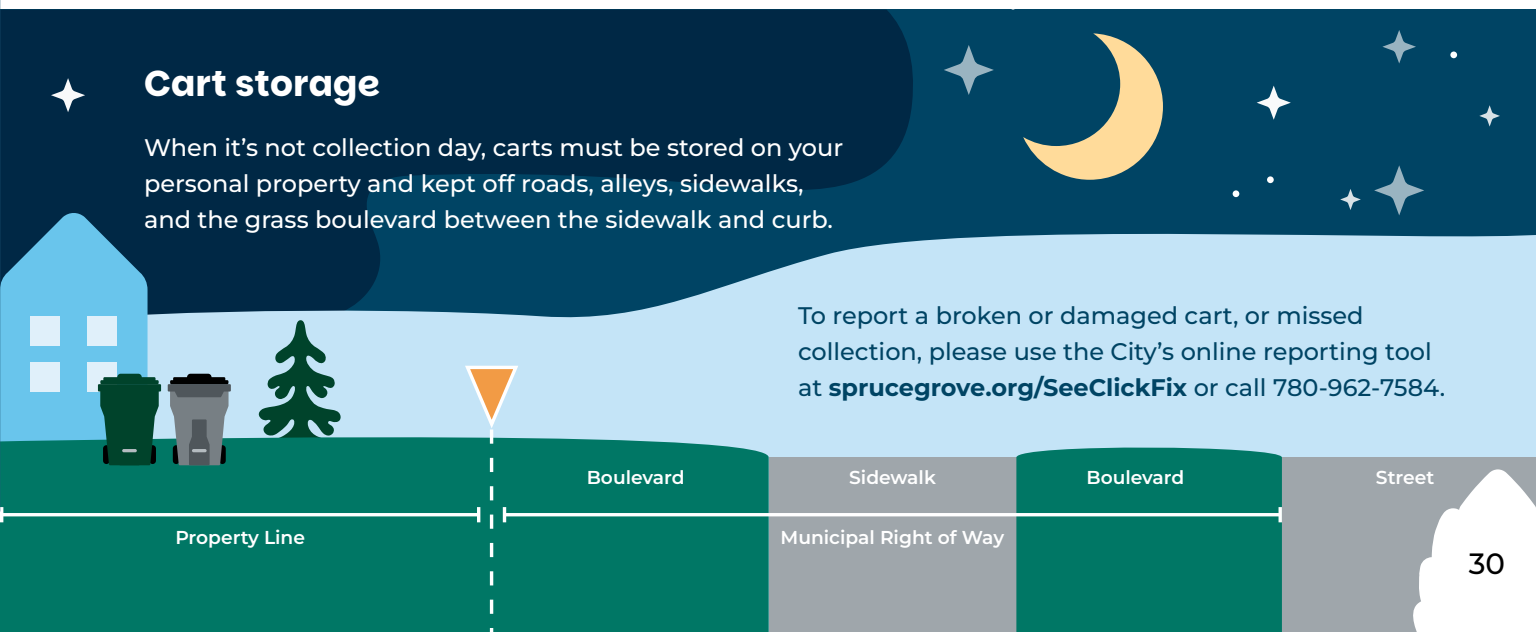
for additional waste collection services. The account holder can request either a 120 litre or 240 litre black waste cart. Green organics carts currently only come in a 240 litre size at this time.

Primary utility account holders can apply for a secondary waste collection cart at sprucegrove.org/SecSuiteWasteApp.

Cart storage

When it's not collection day, carts must be stored on your personal property and kept off roads, alleys, sidewalks, and the grass boulevard between the sidewalk and curb.

Sustainability in Spruce Grove

There are several ways that residents can practice sustainability in our city. Whether it's discovering opportunities for efficiencies in your home or finding ways to conserve water, even small changes can make our community more environmentally friendly.



Harnessing the sun

Last year, a large-scale solar photovoltaic (PV) system, more commonly known as solar panels, was installed on the City's Protective Services building. This marks the second City facility receiving greenhouse gas-reducing and renewable energy upgrades after the first installation at Public Works in 2020.

A total of 1,987 megawatt hours of solar energy has been produced by PV installations on City buildings since installed. That is the equivalent to the average annual electricity use for 540 homes and prevention of 1,077 tonnes of CO₂ equivalent emissions.

Borrow a Home Energy Efficiency Kit

Home Energy Efficiency Kits are available to borrow through the Spruce Grove Public Library, located at the North East Library Branch (50 Westwind Drive, inside Heavy Metal Place) and include a variety of tools for residents to assess their energy consumption, discover opportunities for efficiencies and potential cost savings, and see associated environmental impacts.

Residents can find tools like thermal scanners, fridge and freezer thermometers, radon detectors, thermometers and hygrometers, wattmeters, and air quality monitors in each kit.

A new way to save on energy upgrades

Launched in May 2025, the City's Clean Energy Improvement Program (CEIP) offers Spruce Grove homeowners an innovative way to make energy efficient and renewable energy upgrades to their homes. The program offers financing with a competitive interest rate, long repayment period, and a generous rebate applied directly to the total financing amount.

CEIP will accept applications until all available financing is allocated, but may periodically waitlist applicants or pause intake to assess remaining

available financing. To check if the program is currently accepting applications and to see if you are eligible, visit sprucegrove.org/CEIP.

- Doors, windows, and insulation
- Heating, ventilation, and air conditioning
- Water heating
- Lighting
- Solar panels

Ways to conserve water

Reducing your water usage is one of the many ways you can support drought management efforts while also reducing your water bill.

Choose Energy Star-labelled appliances



Repair leaking faucets or running toilets promptly



Ensure your washing machine is full before running it



Turn off taps while shaving, brushing your teeth, or washing your hair



Install low-flow water fixtures like taps, toilets, and showerheads



Turn your furnace humidifier off when circulating air through your home in the summer

Outdoor water saving tips



Collect rainwater for watering plants and gardens



Choose drought-resistant plants and shrubs



Turn off outdoor faucets at the knob when not in use



Water your lawn when it's cooler – in the morning or evening



Mow your lawn less to allow grass to help shade the soil and reduce the need for watering



Opt for a broom over a hose when cleaning driveways, porches, and exteriors

Permit, licence, and inspection requirements

Take the time to plan ahead



Thinking about doing a home renovation project this year? Or maybe you have a more commercial development in mind?

Before you get started, homeowners should check to see what permits, licences, and inspections they may need. If you're a business owner, you should also review commercial development requirements early in the planning process to avoid delays.

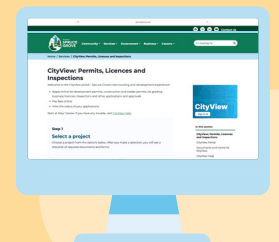
When you're ready to get started, the CityView portal makes it easy to see what documents and forms your project needs to meet building code standards and comply with City of Spruce Grove bylaws.

CityView

Spruce Grove's online portal for all new building and development applications, CityView, will guide you through the process, help determine the type of request, and indicate any required documents needed for your project.

The portal is a simple and convenient way for residents, business owners, builders, and developers to apply for permits, inspections, business licences, and more!

Do I need a permit or application for my project?

The answer is probably yes! CityView supports more than 60 types of common projects, including:

- Building a garage, fence, deck, shed, or installing a hot tub or swimming pool.
- Interior demolitions, basement finishing, building a secondary suite, and air conditioning installation.
- New buildings including single-family homes, multi-family homes, and commercial properties.
- Landscaping, lot grading, and driveways.
- Starting a home business or opening a family day home.
- Plumbing, gas, or electrical work including new installations, upgrades, and modifications.

If you hire a contractor for a project, the contractor will need a business licence to apply for the required permits.

Permit processing times

All applications must be reviewed and may require revisions before they're approved. Avoid delays by submitting your applications early! To check average permit processing times, visit sprucegrove.org/Dashboard.

Inspections

In some cases, an inspection may be needed to complete your project. Inspections can be requested by visiting sprucegrove.org/CityView, signing into your account, and submitting a request for the applicable project.
